From Last General Meeting

– Family Winemaking

Our Guest Speaker for our April meeting was local winemaker and neighbor Ken Jordan.

As summer approaches with lots of good fruits and vegetables (we hope!) there is always the dilemma of what to do with too much. Ken shared with us the perfect answer for how not to let it go to waste, as well as a really great reuse for empty wine bottles. He makes wine with nearly every fruit you can think of and with all sorts of combinations of those fruits. He has used such abundant plants as rhubarb, and many kinds of vegetables. Ken showed us the equipment he uses and illustrated the general process. Home or family winemaking is produced by the gallon generally in three phases: primary fermentation for two weeks, followed by secondary fermentation lasting three to six months, after which your wine is bottled.

Some very good samples and examples were shared. It was a fascinating and delightful topic!

Patapsco-Granite Area Rural Roads Update



Traffic Calming

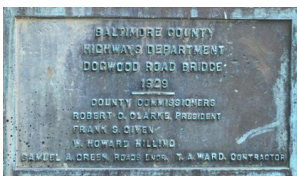
Most of us who live on our connecting roads such as Ridge, Dogwood and Granite have been frustrated by heavy commuter traffic speeding through our neighborhoods. It's a frustration we share with urban residents, who have long been able to petition the county for traffic calming installations. That remedy is now available on all residential streets throughout the county that meet certain criteria. The [Neighborhood Traffic Management Program](#) starts with an

application that is evaluated to determine if it meets 4 basic requirements:

- The road segment to be studied must be at least 1000' long.
- Dead-end streets and cul-de-sacs will not be considered.
- The street must be within the urban rural demarcation boundary HOWEVER consideration will be given to residential neighborhoods outside of the URDL that have an average lot size of 2 acres or less.
- Streets that do not meet the minimum traffic volume requirements will only be re-evaluated every three (3) years

Update on Bridge #72 Dogwood Road over Ben's Run

A team member at Baltimore County Structural Design and Approval has reported that preliminary engineering studies are ongoing for the development of a new bridge design for the Ben's Run bridge. The current bridge was built in 1929 and replaced the existing covered bridge. The new bridge will be two lanes wide and include a pedestrian walkway. Plans are expected to be complete in 2024 when the Baltimore County project will go to bid. They say there will be a

meeting for public comment, but not until plans are complete. Keep in mind the original plans for the bridge replacement were dated 2004. There are NO plans to change the geometry of Quaker Hill; a natural feature that discourages heavy truck traffic from Rolling Road and MD 99 connecting to Old Court Road.

Baltimore County DPW Annual Rural Roads Meeting

Community members and residents met at Oregon Ridge on April 25th to discuss rural roads, bridges, repaving and traffic issues related to preserving Baltimore County's rural Character. The meeting was chaired by DPWT Deputy Director Lauren Buckler and attended by the managers of traffic engineering, major structures, highway management and road repair/repaving. The good news is that funding for road repair, and especially for bridges, has been significantly increased in the new annual budget awaiting County Council passage. This funding is intended to address the backlog of needed repair work. GPCA joined community members from Glyndon, Kingsville, Upperco and Cockeysville areas. Speed and volume of through-traffic was one of the most mentioned issues, as well as needed repairs.

It is most unfortunate that something like that would occur in our community, as we all (done properly!) use signs to communicate important activities.

Learning Critical Skills on a Raining Sunday



Approximately 20 people from our community learned life-saving skills at the CPR/AED/First Aid class held at the Granite Presbyterian Church social hall on April 30. The class was presented by experienced instructors (EMT's and paramedics) from Baltimore County Fire and Medical Training Inc. (BCFMT).

Class participants learned critical skills needed to respond to and manage emergencies until emergency medical services arrive. Hands-on practice focused on developing several important skills:

- Performing CPR chest compressions. Note to all, mouth-to-mouth assisted breathing is no longer part of the current CPR regimen
- Using an automatic external defibrillator (AED)

- Controlling bleeding—through the use of bandages, applying pressure to wounds, and correctly applying a tourniquet when needed
- Providing choking relief in adults, children and infants

The instructors also provided valuable information on responding to: asthma attacks, various allergic response emergencies, opioid overdoses (e.g., use of the now currently-available opioid reversal medicines), cardiac arrest, thermal burns, and venomous snake and insect bites.

The instructors imparted invaluable knowledge and participants learned relevant skills that could help save a life at home or wherever they might be when an emergency occurs.

Eel Ladder

“Don’t it always seem to go that you don’t know what you’ve got til its gone...”.

This lyric from Joni Mitchell’s 1970 song applies to many relationships between “civilization” and nature. On seemly rare occasions, we see nature starting to recover from the encroachments of civilization. One example is in our Patapsco River above Daniels Dam; there the American eels have dramatically increased the last couple of years. How do we know this? Why is it occurring? Why would we care? Read on to find out.

Some species of mussels are totally dependent on eels to transport them upstream. Young female eels become unwitting hosts to our native [Eastern elliptio mussel](#) larvae. This freshwater mussel’s larvae attach to the eel’s gills for transportation to headwaters. Once upstream, the mussels drop off from the eels into the stream-bed to begin their life filtering the water. A single mussel can filter up to 15 gallons of water daily, improving water quality.

Eels are effective apex predators in headwaters. Maryland DNR biologist compared headwater survey data of those containing eels to those that no longer contain eels (because of dams). They found lower fish density and higher aquatic insect density in water that contained eels.



Historically eels comprised about 50% of the fish in Maryland rivers. Dams and overfishing have dramatically reduced their presence. Commercial fishermen sell adult American eels for food to Asia and Europe, mid-sized eels for bait, and glass eels to Chinese fish hatcheries.

There is hope.

Maryland environmental agencies removed



3 dams on the lower Patapsco River. In 2014 they installed an eel ladder at Daniels Dam. For the first several years, their monitoring counted about 30 eels annually, then jumped to over 300 after the last downstream dam was removed. In 2022, over 36,000 eels ascended the Daniels ladder. Paradise

is being restored!
