Current directors Barb Warnock and Marty Kelley are serving 3-year terms expiring in January 2018 and 2019 respectively. Nominations of candidates will also be accepted from the floor on the evening of the election. Obviously, we are looking for someone to serve as president of GPCA over the coming year. Our bylaws state "...the president shall exercise a general supervision over the affairs of the Association and be a member ex-officio of all committees, preside over meetings of the executive Board and general meetings; call special meetings when needed; appoint chairpersons of standing committees, and shall be empowered to appoint such committees as the needs of the Association require".

Candidates must be members of GPCA for a minimum of 6 months immediately preceding the election. Per our bylaws, officers are elected for a 1-year term and directors for 3-year terms. The President may serve for two consecutive 1-year terms and may again become eligible after a 1-year lapse. The lapse period applies to no other Executive Board members. Directors whose terms expire may be reelected for 3-year terms.

#### **GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT**

The Holidays are fast approaching, and snow days will quickly follow. Oh, where did the summer go?! As a Master Electrician, I want to remind everyone about Safe Holiday Lighting. Connecting too many string lights together can be dangerous. manufacture's specifications for safety. Homeowners typically purchase extension cords that are flat in appearance. Known in the trade as "zip cords", they can only handle two or three light string at a time, regardless the number of sockets available to plug in additional lights. Many light strings have sockets on the end of the stringer, which can extend the light strand. Purchase the correct number of lights on a strand, for your project to help avoid "plug in overload". Always follow the manufacturers' labels for the number of light strings that can be safety connected. Most homeowners do not realize that these specifications are usually stated in "watts", not length or number of lights on a string. And, under NO CIRCUMSTANCES should you hide these, or any cords, underneath a rug. This has been proven a fire hazard. Practice safety this holiday, to help keep it Happy, Merry, and Bright!

At the November General Meeting, we hosted Rose Bianca, Senior Investigator with the Motor Vehicle Administration. Her focus was on identity theft. If you have been a victim of identity theft, take the following steps:

- File a police report.
- Place a fraud alert with all three major credit bureaus.
- Contact banks and all creditors.
- File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.

So we have our holidays to gather and decorate and put the decorations out for the neighbors to see. Because even in the darkest day of winter, you know that spring will come.
